 - Reverend Christopher opened the meeting with a prayer at 10:26 am.
- 2. Appointment of Clerk:
 - Marianne Zinkewicz was appointed to take the minutes as the Vestry Clerk.

This resolution was amended via a motion by John Fortman, seconded by Caroline Morgan and passed unanimously to be effective as of February 26, 2023. The resolution passed unanimously.

Discussions the vestry had at their annual retreat and a fall follow-up retreat on how St. Stephen's could live into our baptismal covenant, become the heartbeat of the community, be an undeniable force for justice, a spiritual have and center of thought.
- Two seminarians, Payton Hoegh and Kathryn Nishibayashi, join us during 2022 as they discern their spiritual paths.
- St. Stephen's hosted an Interfaith service to commemorate the lives lost

and people injured in recent mass shootings that occurred in Laguna Hills, CA and Buffalo, NY in May.

• Christopher talked about the outside organizations we host on our campus and especially mentioned the Boy Scouts.

On behalf of the Vestry, Staff, and ministry leaders of St. Stephen's, I am pleased to present to you the 2023 Annual Report. The reports that follow represent a dynamic community of caring people with a heart for justice, a profound love for God and an eye for the future. It is always a thrill for me to read these reports and think back to all that happened in the last 12 months. As you read these reports I hope you will all reflect on where you find yourself in these stories and how you have been woven into the fabric of our parish life and rejoice with me in the blessing that is the parish of St. Stephen's.

2023 was a big year in the life of our community as we marked our 60th year of seeking and serving Jesus Christ in the Santa Clarita Valley.

We set the tone for the year when we hosted a wonderful Interfaith Service of Peace Tolerance & Love to honor the legacy and ministry of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Folks from all across the city joined us and we were delighted to collaborate with our friends from Congregation Beth Shalom and the Islamic Center of Santa Clarita Valley with representative form each community and other civic leaders taking part in the experience.

As we entered February and found ourselves in the midst of Black History Month there were sights and sounds all around us lifting up the accomplishments and contributions of our Black siblings that all too often go uncelebrated. From carefully curated musical selections during worship from our beloved Music Director Judy Baity to the wonderful array of informative bulletin boards across our campus, coordinated by Rosa Holdrege and brought to life by a wonderful cohort of volunteers who keep our boards fresh and exciting all year long. Perhaps the highlight of the month was the panel discussion with our friends from the Santa Clarita chapter of the NAACP and brought to us by the St. Stephen's Anti-racism Coalition which brought together powerful voiced on the panel and drew an audience of those both the parish and the city community at large.

In early 2023 we took some time to retool the The Welcome Table format. As most of you know, TWT is a service created specifically for those in the LGBTQ+ community who have been hurt by The Church, have had The Bible used as a weapon against them and who have struggled to find a place to explore their faith and be their authentic selves. In March we were excited to welcome Kevin Wood to the table as he signed on as the music director for this experience. Keving regularly serves as the Music Director of Christ Church, Redondo Beach and drives up from Long Beach each month. Kevin has leveraged his gifts as an accomplished musician to enliven The Welcome Table. It has been a blessing to share this work with him and we are grateful for the grant money from our friends at St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Winnetka that makes paying Kevin for his contribution possible.

Of course, our annual pancake supper benefiting Children & Youth ministry here at St. Stephen's got us ready to enter into our Lenten observance. Big thanks to our YESS: Youth Engaged @ St. Stephen's and their families for all their hard work putting this sentimental favorite together each year.

As we journeyed through Lent, we engaged an exploration of the life and witness of Peter, the one who would become the rock upon which Jesus would build his Church. Using the book *Simon Peter: Flawed and faithful Disciple* by Adam Hamilton. Over 20 members of the congregation gathered on Monday nights during Lent to explore Peter's life and by doing so went deeper into the Lenten experience.

With the arrival of March and Women's History Month we were excited to host yet another powerful forum as we welcomed a distinguished panel made up of Canon to The Ordinary, The Rev. Canon Melissa McCarthy, former Vicar/Rector of St. Stephen's, The Rev. Canon Lynn Jay, parishioner, The Rev. Fran Cantella and Seminarian, Kathryn Nishibayashi to discuss the role of women in the Church.

Also in March, the vestry gathered for its annual retreat facilitated by theologian, David Tremaine. David is an organizational consultant working with faith-based organizations to better understand and respond to racial, ethnic, and power dynamics within communities. He led us through a daylong retreat which was broken into three categories of; "Where we have been.", "Where we are." & "Where we are going." This experience was not only where we began to lay out the framework of what would become our 60th anniversary celebrations, but also where we began to talk about paving the way into the next 60 years in the life of our community.

Our Holy Week and Easter services at St. Stephen's in 2023 were exceptional. We were thrilled to add a new service of Tenebrae into our Holy week services thanks to the collaboration and dedication of parishioners Roger & Jennie Lamb and our friends from The Scenic Hills Singers. Then in May we welcomed Bishop Taylor to St. Stpehen's for his bi-annual Episcopal Visit with a special liturgy with confirmations, receptions, special music, and a festive celebration following the service.

June marks LGBTQ+ Pride month and St. Stephen's was proud to dedicate the First Sunday in June as "Pride Sunday" with a special liturgy and a celebration following the 10:30 service in collaboration with our friends from the Santa Clarita Chapter of PFLAG.

June also marked the unexpected departure of Director of Children's Education and Formation. We give thanks for Melanie's service to our community, and we wish her the best in all of her future endeavors.

Following Melanie's departure a hiring committee was formed to handle the search for a new director which comprised of St. Stephen's Teachers Christina Troupe & Laurie Crevier, Preschool Board member and parent, Heather Layman, COC Faculty member and Early Childhood specialist, Cindy Stephen's, myself and Jr. Warden James Mackey. I want to offer my deep gratitude to our Hiring Committee. This group of talented professionals took on a big and complex task and I want to honor their hard work and professionalism during the process.

I would like to give a big shout of thanks to Preschool Manager, Stephanie Rodriguez for all of her hard work and dedication and for all that she did during an extended leadership transition to ensure that things at our beloved preschool were maintained and running smoothly.

In September Gina Guaderrama-Frezieres signed on to the role of Youth Ministry Coordinator and immediately got to work building a strong fall program for our youth and establishing connection and relationship with the members of our youth group.

As we entered into fall much of our collective energy began to focus on our 60th anniversary celebrations. Beginning "Story Day" in early August facilitated by The Rev Thom Quijada-Discavage from the Bishop's office then continuing with a series of movie nights taking us through the decades to the creation of a dynamic visual timeline in Spurling Hall it became clear there was a lot to celebrate.

Of course, the culmination of our diamond jubilee was our gala celebration and auction in October, co-chaired by Jen Aston and Erick Long and produced by a whole host of volunteers. It was a glittering night where the people of St. Stephen's were joined by our community partners and civic leaders including Mayor of Santa Clarita, Jason Gibbs CA Assemblymember Pilar Schiavo and representatives from the office of Senator Scott Wilk. I would like to express my deep gratitude to Jen, Erick, and everyone who worked so hard to make this event such a success.

At the gala we celebrated our history and laid out a bold new vision for the future of our campus and community. And in doing so raised approximately \$40,000!

Earlier in the year the Vestry contracted the services of capital campaign consultant Maurice Seaton to advise us on the possibility of mounting a capital campaign. Following the gala, the newly formed Capital Campaign Committee, chaired by vestry member Dave Melton, put together a series of "cottage conversations" where members of the congregation came together to discuss their hopes for the future of St. Stephen's and our campus.

Our formal celebration of our anniversary came to a close on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, otherwise known as "Gratitude Sunday" with a special service and potluck in the morning and a rousing service of Jazz Vespers in the evening. Jazz Vespers is a labor of love that would not be possible without the tireless dedication of the inimitable Judy Baity who put together a stellar collection of music and gathered exceptional musicians to bring that music to life.

We continue to be enriched by the presence of the Scouts on our campus. With a wonderful celebration of Scout Sunday in February again in 2023 several scouts again chose to make St. Stephen's the beneficiary of their Eagle Scout projects as a symbol of their commitment back to us. In the past year we saw the transformation of our breezeway, the renovation and revitalization of our prayer garden and the installation of lighting in the courtyard. We give thanks for the hard work and dedication of the scouts, for their presence among us and for all that they do.

In 2023 we amended our service schedule to allow for a more meaningful program of Sunday Forums between services. 2023 forum topics ranged from an Inquirers' Class to an exploration of the Nicene Creed to a study of The Ten Commandments to budget reviews and a discussion about the future of our congregation.

We continue with our efforts to establish St. Stephen's as the heartbeat of Santa Clarita so we continue to make our campus available for local theater groups to use as rehearsal space, for special music presentations such as two concerts by The Scenic Hills Singers in July & December, providing space for 12 step meetings, PFLAG and other organizations and groups needing support. We also hosted "A Jazzy Christmas Carol" in December, a screening of the Christmas Classic accompanied by a live neo-soul jazz quartet. which was open to the whole community.

As I am sure you all know there is so much more that happened at St. Stephen's in 2023 and I look forward to expanding what I have shared here during my address at the meeting.

Of course, nothing would be possible without the dedication of all our volunteers, people who are deeply committed to service and the people our community serves.

Thanks be to God for our amazing Altar Guild and Ushers and Greeters for their holy work of preparing our sacred spaces and welcoming people into it and to the stalwart members of the Tech Guild who work so hard to make worship accessible to those who cannot be physically present. I give thanks for the blessing of our Music Director, Judy Baity, who along with Frank Browne led the choirs of St. Stephen's with skill and dedication and all of our choirs' members for their gift of music. Also, the members of our readers' team continued to beautifully illuminate holy scripture for us as part of our worship experience.

I want to honor our stellar vestry members who give so much of themselves to ensure the strength of our community, especially our wardens, Bob Gregor and James Mackey as well as our Treasurer, John Fortman, Clerk of the Vestry, Marianne Zinkewicz, and Bookkeeper, Donna Maldonado for their wonderful work on behalf of St. Stephen's.

As I always say, our Sexton, Maria Lopez, is an unsung angel at St. Stephen's. Many folks never get to see Maria, but her impact on our school and parish life is felt every day and we give thanks for her and for all she does for us.

Finally, I wish to express my profound appreciation for our Parish Administrator, Tracy Stapp. Tracy is the heartbeat of our community. Serving the people of St. Stephen's is Tracy's ministry. She is a gift to this community, and we are better because she is a part of us. I give thanks for the gift of spending every day with her and I could not ask for a better partner on the journey.

I hope you will see the pages of this report as a testament to the work of the Holy Spirit among us. My continued prayer is that you will rejoice in what we have accomplished and resolve yourself to participate in the work we have yet to do.

As always, I ask God's blessing on each and every one of you and on those you love. I can't wait to see what the Holy Spirit does with us next. For now, this is me sending you love and wishing you peace,

<u>St. Stephen's Vestry Portfolio Annual Report</u> January 28, 2024

Reverend Christopher and I met on a regular basis throughout the year, including breakfast meetings on occasion with the Junior Warden James Mackey, to discuss specific matters important to the Church at any given time. These included, but were not limited to, budgetary matters regarding the Church and the Pre-School, hiring a new Pre-School Director, responsibilities regarding our Capital Campaign, nomination of new candidates for the Vestry and selected on-going issues regarding community relations, e.g. collaboration with other constituents in the community on matters important to St-Stephens Church. I worked with five (five) separate committees during 2023 and this report will be organized around my responsibilities within each of those Committees.

Stewardship Committee:

I remained in touch with the **Stewardship Committee** and joined several meetings during year. My input to the Committee, initially, was focused on the development of our *"theme"* and the schedule of events and goals outlined for the Pledge Drive during the fall. The Pledge campaign began on October 22nd and ended on November 19th, 2023. The first few months of 2023 were focused on the timing and scheduling of events during the campaign and subsequently on the actual Pledge Drive itself. The eventual *"theme"* of the campaign was *"Rooted in Abundance."* While the total amount of money obtained in Pledges did not meet the goal set initially by the Stewardship Committee, the final amount exceeded the amount we received in 2022. *(see the Stewardship Committee Annual Report)*

<u>My primary role on the Committee</u> was to schedule three speakers from the Vestry during the fall campaign of 2023. Having speakers from the Vestry present at each of two services on three separate Sundays actually started in 2022 with a central theme related to: *"What does are vision look like? What is our hope for the future? What do we need to make our Vision a reality and what are we willing to risk/invest to live into this vision?"* Maintaining this central theme, our four speakers in the fall of 2023 were Steve Plote, Mary Jo Higgenbotham, Kathleen Jensen and myself. We covered both services on October 22nd, November 5th and November 12th.

My final responsibility on the Committee is to send "thank you" notes to an assigned list of names; pledge units in the parish who committee to a pledge for 2024.

Finance Committee:

My primary role on the **Finance Committee** is to assist Reverend Christopher and John Fortman in my role as Senior Warden working with budget and issues related to income and expenditures to and from the Church and the Pre-School. I attended a meeting with Reverend Christopher and leadership in the Diocese regarding our financial responsibilities to the Diocese and to the parishioners of St-Stephens.

I also have "signing" responsibilities regarding financial matters for St. Stephens. (See the Annual Report for the Finance Committee)

Security Committee:

I am working with Steve Plote and Sheri Flay on developing a **Safety Manual for the Church**. We are at the point where we will send the Vestry a second draft of our document for further

recommendations. To date, we have a draft of the Emergency Manual that includes a proposed phone tree for emergencies, a list of important phone numbers, recommendations on an Emergency Response Team, Building Emergency Procedures and an Emergency Egress Plan. In addition, I have contacted local emergency organizations, i.e. the Fire Department, to explore resources for emergency response training. This includes the AHA and the Red Cross, for information on training selected individuals in CPR, etc.

Capital Campaign Committee:

I was involved with our **Capital Campaign Committee**, Dave Melton as Chair, to help organize and conduct *"Cottage Meetings"* in the fall of 2023. The purpose of those meeting was to discuss, with our parishioners, their thoughts on campus improvements. During an initial Discernment phase, I and several others on the Vestry served as facilitators of discussions by attendees regarding their sense of needed improvements that should/could be made to our Church campus. Points of discussion focused on flexibility, accessibility, sustainability, responsibility and community. Notes were taken and organized into general categories and I joined further committee discussion on whether we should, given the information we took away from these meetings, move to a Feasibility phase. We are currently at the stage to make that decision. *(See the Annual Report for the Capital Campaign Committee)*

Vestry Nominating Committee:

The major portion of my time this past five weeks has been spent going through the process, as Chair of the **Nominating Committee**, of generating a list of candidates for approval by the Vestry and subsequently by the parishioners to join the Vestry in 2024. Committee membership included James Mackey (Junior Warden), Julie Johnson (rotating off the Vestry), Jay Clark (Member at Large) and myself as Chair. We originally generated a working list of 34 names which came to me from Committee members, the Very Reverend Christopher, the Vestry members and long-time church members who declined to be nominated as a candidate but recommended individuals who they felt should be considered. For a variety of reasons this final list we called totaled 29 names. We began calling individuals on the list in mid-December and had the four candidates needed to replace the four members rotating off the Vestry on January 28th by the end of the second week in January.

Sunday Morning Forums: Christopher and Shannon Brintnall have been meeting to discuss forward planning for Sunday Forums, adult education, and adult affinity groups. A parish wide survey is currently in process and will be sent shortly to get feedback from the congregation on areas of interest and availability.

Non-Credit Spanish and Women's History Classes: College of the Canyons, COC, has agreed to offer each of these classes at St. Stephen's. Julie Johnson is working on writing the curriculum for the Women's History class. An instructor needs to be found to write the Spanish language curriculum and to teach the classes. Once the curricula are finished plans can be made to offer the class to the parish and anyone in the greater community who is interested.

Praesidium Academy: Praesidium Academy is the Episcopal Church's partner in ensuring that church staff, ministry leaders, and volunteers are educated on safe practices regarding working with and around children as well as child abuse neglect and reporting procedures. Discussions on what types of trainings will be required for staff and ministry leaders are ongoing. Additional trainings for specialized ministry contexts are also available through Praesidium Academy. Tracy Stapp is the administrator for Praesidium Academy at St. Stephen's.

ALTAR GUILD

The ministry of the Altar Guild is to prepare the elements and space used for our worship. This includes vesting the altar and sanctuary in seasonally appropriate colors, arranging the flowers, maintaining the silver and crystal, cleaning the linens and preparing the priest's vestments. We support weekly services as well as any special services that are scheduled.

The Altar Guild also oversees and coordinates memorial gifts that will enhance our worship. This Christmas we were very grateful to the Scott Higginbotham Memorial Fund for the monies needed to make the coronation tapestry banner overlays. These overlays were made following Rev. Christopher's description of what he thought would make the white banners "pop" rather than disappear into the room, especially on our livestream.

We have appreciated members of the Men's Group, most specifically Steve Plote, and the assistance with the changing of the banners. This past December 24 we once again had the challenge of the 4th Sunday of Advent and Christmas Eve falling on the same day. A very enthusiastic group of people joined the Altar Guild members on Saturday, December 23rd to prepare as much as possible and bring greens without lights or color into the Sanctuary. After our one 9 am 4th Advent service, some of the same as well as additional people helped us to finish preparing the sanctuary for our Christmas Eve services. Additionally, a small but energetic group of people helped us to remove the remaining Christmas decorations after Epiphany.

Nick Vestuto joined our ministry after the Ministry Fair in the fall. Nick has learned very quickly and is a great addition to our group. We appreciate his addition to the team. As a group, we continue to support each other, covering weekends as needed for travel and illness.

Anti-Racism Coalition (ARC)

St. Stephen's Anti-Racism Coalition was formed in early 2021 to help develop a better understanding of personal and systemic racism within our parish and the SCV community.

One of ARC's high points last year was hosting a live video presentation with Freedom Rider, Joan Browning, who was part of the 1961 Albany Freedom Ride. She was the only white woman to be put in jail where she spent five days. In 2005, Browning received the Martin Luther King Achievement Award.

In February, ARC was pleased to host a Sunday Forum featuring a panel from the SCV Chapter of the NAACP in honor of Black History Month. Valerie Bradford, NAACP President spoke about the history of NAACP and the SCV Chapter. Members of the panel then discussed why it was important to establish a chapter in Santa Clarita, along with some of the strides the group has made to create racial harmony in our community since its inception.

2023 saw ARC members participate in activities including:

- Attending *"An Afternoon with Dr. Angela Davis"* a special presentation at COC in February featuring a public conversation with social justice activist and educator Angela Davis.
- Hosting a table at the annual Ministry Fair.
- In conjunction with the Santa Clarita Branch of the NAACP, ARC members collected 79 new backpacks and filled them with school supplies for local students in need.
- In October, ARC joined forces with the St. Stephen's Sages to fill 29 large "Thanksgiving Bags" to give Santa Clarita families. Each bag contained a frozen turkey, gravy mix, cranberry sauce, a bag of potatoes, stuffing mix, dessert packages, and napkins! The Thanksgiving Bags were distributed by our local NAACP with help from a Hart School District social worker.

Weekly articles were written for the parish email and Sunday bulletins, along with bulletin board displays in the narthex, parish hall, and the preschool board outside the church office to help honor and celebrate Black History, Hispanic Heritage, Asian American Pacific Islanders (AAPI), and Indigenous Peoples, among others.

ARC continued its membership as a congregational member of the H. Belfield Hannibal (Diocesan) Chapter of the Union of Black Episcopalians (UBE), an organization created to fight racism and encourage the involvement of Black people in the total life of the church.

2023 Buildings and Grounds Annual Report

There were a number of repair projects around the preschool and church that were handyman level fixes. The B&G people were able to attend to those. Rain gutter cleaning, plumbing repairs, Hand soap dispensers, Doorstops, Light fixtures, Tree trimming, etc.

The tree in the Pet Memorial had to be cut back and trimmed due to severe wind damage.

Replaced the Sanctuary HVAC system thermostat to an older model which everyone in the Parish was familiar with the operation of. It matches the other ones in Spurling Hall and the Sacristy office. We tested for mold contamination in the preschool classrooms after the heavy rains in February; results were negative.

Had major leaks in the Sanctuary repaired and the exterior window recalked. Then recalked all of the windows on the south side of the Sanctuary building.

Repainted the preschool classrooms, doors and cubbies.

Lights in the Parking lot were fixed and the timer that controlled them and the timer for the lights on Rm 10 were replaced.

A new fence and gates were installed on the preschool play area to provide more privacy to the children. A subset of that project became the rerouting of the electricity to the Brian building for lights; etc.

The non-functioning Soda Machine from removed from Spurling Hall and the opening boarded up with plans for a dry wall replacement and reuse of the space in the chair room.

We added 4 Ring cameras to the campus for safety and security after a couple of break-ins at the breezeway gate.

Underground Termites that infected the mulberry tree in the preschool playground were treated and removed.

We installed a grab bar in the women's restroom in Spurling Hall

Lastly, a few Eagle Scout projects needed collaboration with the B&G committee to confirm successful execution.

For 2024 we want a couple of group cleaning projects and some light painting work around the Church and Spurling Hall.

2024 Priority repair is Church roof shingles on south facing side of building.

Children's Ministry Report 2023

Every year we strive in the Children's Ministry to foster a deeper understanding of biblical principles and stories as well as help children develop a personal relationship with God. However, we felt that these goals could be better achieved if we could give the children more community and a feeling of belonging with the church. This year we focused on providing a physical space dedicated to children's use and exploring more opportunities for the children to participate in or conjunction with the other church activities.

At the start of Sunday school year in the fall, we welcomed the children to the newly remodeled Godly Play space on the stage in Spurling Hall. Fresh paint, a cozy carpet for storytelling, and an activity center is now a permanent fixture for Sunday school use. Next to the stage, we included a play area for young children to use whenever they might be at church with their family. By having a place of their own, we hope to make the children feel welcome and at home in their place of worship.

We have also been looking at the various church activities and asking ourselves how the children could be included. This resulted in adding a children's component to our Gala fundraiser. Seven children attended their own pumpkin-themed party at the Gala. We had a great time eating pizza, playing pumpkin games, and making pumpkin crafts. We will continue finding other opportunities to include our younger members in church activities in the upcoming year.

Our established programs are thriving. Godly Play is our Sunday school program for preschool through 6th grade, and it has had an increase in attendance since last year. Pathfinders, our junior youth program, continues to meet after church in conjunction with the youth group, exploring the Sunday lectionary through Spark curriculum. The nursery was under the tender care of Maggie D'isa during the first half of the year and was followed by Paloma Lozano who now warmly welcomes the little ones into her care. Our Easter Egg Hunt was well-attended after both Easter services. Trunk-or-Treat, under the direction of Stephanie Rodriguez, was a great success with a balloon twister and professional face painter to add to the entertainment. The Gingerbread House Decorating party had around 50 in attendance from both preschool and church, and at the year's end, we celebrated the annual family Christmas service with 16 children performing in the pageant.

We have made modest progress, but not everything is going well in children's ministry. Due to a lack of volunteers, vacation bible school was canceled. Not having enough volunteers is a liability for the future of the children's ministry. We have come a long way in the last several years, but there cannot be any more growth without more adult participation. Adult volunteers are not only essential to providing safety and assistance, but they also bring creative ideas and help form bonds which bring the children into the church community. In the next year, our goal will be to bring more adult volunteers into our circle in order to be able to increase the fun and learning opportunities for those children who have come to us to be fed spiritually.

I do want to recognize Carol Vestuto who has given of her time and talent to Sunday school every year for the last 3 years. I want to thank my teenage volunteers; Clara Nold, Elise Mackey and Lain Nelson who assist with the children and contribute to the Sunday school experience. I also give my thanks to Mary Jo Higgenbotham and Carol Vestuto for their help with the Christmas pageant. And finally, I want to thank my partners, Gina Guaderrama-Frezieres of youth ministries and Stephanie Rodriguez of the preschool, for teaming-up with me to provide the events that make St. Stephen's Church into a more welcoming place for children and their families.

DOK members participate in discussions of spiritual growth and development, discover new prayer practices, consider service projects, or listen and learn from empowering guest speakers.

In April we listened to a sermon titled "*All the Marys*" by Diana Butler Bass who shared information from her friend and colleague, Dr. Elizabeth Schrader, **an American biblical scholar.** Schrader studies discrepancies between the earliest <u>manuscripts of the gospels</u> and **concentrates on studies concerning Mary Magdalene and the Gospel of John.** It was a fascinating discovery!

A podcast hosted by Reza Aslan entitled "*Metaphysical Milkshake*" was our program for June. Aslan, a contemporary theologian, scholar of world religions, and author of four books, interviewed comedic actor, producer, and writer Rainn Wilson. who talked about his new book "*Soul Boom – Why We Need a Spiritual Revolution*". Exploring the problem-solving benefits that spirituality gives us to create solutions for an increasingly challenging world, Rainn talked about his recent book titled "*Soul Boom – Why We Need a Spiritual Revolution*".

We supported PFLAG on Pride Sunday by bringing food for the after-service luncheon and then met upstairs for a short meeting and an inspiring program led by Fran Cantella. Beginning with a reading of the poem "*Christ-hymn*" by Sandra R. Duguid, Fran helped us explore descriptive phrases of who Jesus was on earth and who he is as the post-resurrection Christ through creative writing.

There was a wonderful turnout for our *"Women, Wisdom & Wine"* social gathering the end of August at Joanie Stanzione's home and in September, we hosted a table at the annual Ministry Fair. Once a month we host coffee hour after the 10:30 church service.

New participants register beginning with year 1 and move forward in sequential order: <u>Year 1</u> Reads: *The Old Testament, "The Hebrew Bible"* by John Collins & "*The Hebrew Bible: Feminist & Intersectional Perspective*" edited by Gale Yee

<u>Year 2</u> Reads: *The New Testament, "Introducing the New Testament"* by Mark Allan Powell, & *"What Are Biblical Values"* by John Collins

Year 3 Reads: "History of Christianity" by Diamaid MacCulloch

<u>Year 4</u> Reads: *"Theology: A Very Short Introduction"* by David Ford, *"Mysteries of Faith"* by Mark McIntosh, *"The Christian Moral Life"* by Timothy Sedgwick, and *"My Neighbor's Faith"* edited by Jennifer Howe Peace

In addition to completing their respective texts, last year's participants read and discussed the book, "*Healing Our Broken Humanity*" by Dr. Kim and Graham Hill and then wrote a group lamentation. We also studied "*Reading the Bible from the Margins*" by Miguel De La Torres, evaluating how issues involving race, class, and gender influence our understanding of the Bible.

External Community Outreach 2023

External Community consists of three categories: the Unhoused and/or persons needing living assistance, Children & Youth, and the wider Santa Clarita Valley Community. These are categories that our vestry has chosen to concentrate on for St. Stephen's to become the heartbeat of the valley. As a group we have tried to make sure that we live into our baptismal vow to strive for justice and respect the dignity of every human being.

Over the last year our Laundry Love outreach has continued to be led by Cindy Swaisgood and a small group of volunteers including Diane Shaw and Martha Lewis. Completely funded by parishioner donations they average 95 washes and 89 dries each month! This is amazing since the amount for each load continues to rise. Our volunteers also provide detergent, water, fruit, cookies, and clean bags for their clients. Many happy people are grateful for this service St. Stephen's provides.

At the same time as the food collection every month, Diane Shaw collects plastic, glass, and aluminum for recycling and averages \$72 per month. While this money does not go directly to a community partner it does indirectly by helping our bottom line. Mary Roberti and others can usually be seen helping with these collections as well.

Other ways we have helped the unhoused and those needing additional assistance this past year was through our annual Blood Drive in conjunction with UCLA where 15 units of blood was collected, and a donation of \$500 to Family Promise as a sponsorship for their annual Golf tournament. As for Bridge to Home, four members of St. Stephen's are on their Board of Directors.

Children and Youth in our valley are of great concern to St. Stephen's. In the past year we have provided space to the Boy Scouts for their meetings, and many of the scouts have chosen projects around our campus for their Eagle Scout projects. At Christmas time we "adopted" six teens through Fostering Youth Independence organization and generously provided wanted gifts worth an average of \$250 per person. Our other Christmas partner is Prison Fellowship Angel Tree. Again, our generous parish provided gifts to 72 children from 34 families with an incarcerated parent.

Throughout the year as we worked to get more name awareness out in Santa Clarita, we tried to participate in more civic events. Jason O'Leary again led the St. Stephen's Striders in raising money for Alzheimer's research. We had one of the largest teams at the walk, consisting of 25 members, and raised \$3,995 which was 7th highest overall. The walk raised \$168,765 and surpassed the goal of \$155,000!

St. Stephen's continues to be a safe space for the LGBTQ+ community. Not only did we continue The Welcome Table monthly, but we were also able to be part of Castaic Pride at the Park in July. Many volunteers came out to spread the word about all the good we are doing. In 2024 we will continue to build on this foundation.

Parish Financials

The accompanying financial reports represent the 2023 year-end for the church. The 2023 budget projected an almost \$14,000 net shortfall in our operating fund and that is close to where we ended up. While our operating fund showed a loss, you will see on the balance sheet that our bank account balances and our total of fund balances increased. This is due in great part to the Gala, which netted almost \$38,000 thanks to the generosity of our community and beyond.

There are entries still to be recorded for 2023, including typical year-end entries and depreciation of fixed assets. These will generate an expected net change in Operating Fund net income of less than \$3,000.

On the balance sheet we show \$100,893 in cash assets and the rest in fixed assets. We have two long term liabilities – the loan for resurfacing the preschool roof which will be paid off in February 2029, and the diocesan loan for the sanctuary build which the finance committee is in discussion about ways to pay this loan off sooner rather than later. The remaining section of the balance sheet shows the fund balances for all of the designated donations that have been given as well as the Eagle Scout project balances and the Gala fundraising balance.

We did very well in pledge income, exceeding projected by nearly \$26,000. This may have affected our plate as plate donors may have shifted to pledge donors. Plate income is about \$13,000 less than we projected. We did, however, receive a larger than expected Christmas offering this year. Overall, the church gross income for 2023 was almost \$16,000 more than expected.

Next we turn to our expenses. Primarily at Rev. Christopher's behest the treasurer has worked hard over the last few years to make sure our mission share assessment to the diocese is at the minimum of 12%. This is the second year now that our mission share is at 12%, and we are thankful that we can meet this standard.

The church also makes monthly transfers of \$500 each to the Operating Reserve Fund and to the Buildings and Grounds Fund. This is important as our campus gets older and work needs to be done. A \$300 transfer to the sabbatical fund is also made every month in preparation for the time that Rev. Christopher takes to renew his spirit.

The largest expense category is in payroll. Some of this is offset by a cost sharing agreement in place between the church and preschool for our Sexton and Bookkeeper, as well as some other utility bills that the church pays, and the preschool reimburses. Since these costs are easy to predict this expense has come in right on target.

Some of the utilities are hard to predict and we use historical information to budget those items. Some of you may have noticed your home gas bills higher than usual at the beginning of the year. The same happened with the church gas bill and you can see that it was \$1900 over budget. We also had some issues with the phone and fire alarm bills, but we now seem to have those amounts under control. Overall, utilities came in \$2839 over budget.

Business Expense—everything from utilities to paperclips—came in over budget by about \$11,300 A good part of this is due to costs associated with online giving. Other culprits were the printer/copier costs, a new laptop, and workers comp costs.

Through generous donations to the Music Fund, we were able to offset music expense by almost \$4,400 transferred from the Music Fund to the Operating Fund. Your generous donations to the Altar Flowers Fund helped to offset the costs of flowers applied to the Operating Fund. (These directed donations are not considered as part of your pledge.)

We were also over in hospitality expenses and other miscellaneous expenses, the biggest being \$2,375 paid to a consultant for the discernment phase of a capital campaign and \$2,056 for the creation of the Coronation Banner Overlays by Mary Mercogliano. This latter expense will be offset by a transfer from the Scott Higginbotham Memorial Fund.

The treasurer and the finance committee have worked hard over the year to put some good policies and procedures in place, especially for expense overages, and look to continue this into 2024.

Preschool Financials

St. Stephen's Preschool has a different fiscal year than the church. Year end is July 30, so this narrative will first address the 2022/2023 financials and then give an update year to date (YTD) for 2023/2024.

Fiscal Year End July 2023:

At the beginning of the fiscal year, August 1, 2022, the Preschool total assets were \$271,119, almost all in various bank accounts. By July 31, 2023, the amount was \$278,346, a net increase of \$7,227. Liabilities increased by \$7,941 which are mostly in tuition deposits collected at registration to pay for the final weeks of preschool, and so are considered unearned tuition payments.

The preschool earned almost \$27,000 more in tuition than expected. This was partly due to an increase in fees and actual enrollment numbers. They also received a \$6,500 grant that helped increase the balance of the Preschool Buildings and Grounds Fund after some outlays for needed maintenance.

In contrast, budgeted expenses were exceeded by about \$25,000. Almost half of that amount being a shared salary with the church that only happened for part of the year instead of the entire year. The remaining excess came in the form of increased hours for assistant teachers because of higher-than-expected enrollment—a good problem to have. Amounts paid to the Preschool's payment processor, Brightwheel, are higher than budgeted due to families paying using credit card payments rather than ACH. Beginning in June 2024, the Preschool will no longer absorb these fees.

All of this to say that the preschool ended fiscal year 2023 with a \$14,717 shortfall. This was better than budgeted though which anticipated a \$17,000 loss.

Fiscal Year End July 2024 – as of December 30

Bringing the assts balance of \$278,346 forward to begin the current fiscal year, as of December 30th, which is the fifth of twelve months, total assets number falls to \$257,995. This is also accompanied by a corresponding change in liabilities, indicating there are amounts to be collected which have not hit the bank yet.

Gross income is under budget by \$6,000 and is due to tuition not coming in as budgeted. This could be simply a timing issue. December tuition came in as expected, so we are expecting that to hold for

the remainder of the year.

As we move on to expenses, you will notice that salaries for the Admin Assistant, Teachers, and Assistant Teachers are higher than expected. This is because we did not have a Preschool Director during this time. Staff members stepped up to help when needed, and the Admin Assistant, Stephanie Rodriguez, was given a bonus for all the work she put in during that time. The preschool also had several students who needed one on one attention which affected the assistant teacher salaries. Since a director was not being paid during this time, the budgeted salary expense was only exceeded by \$3500.

A few other expenses that appear to be high currently include - Office Supplies, which are generally higher at the beginning and should even out over the rest of the year; Professional Development, which includes special training provided to staff that was unbudgeted; and the Brightwheel expense, which is about 45% over budget.

So far, for this current fiscal year the preschool is doing well. Total expenses through December are close to projected and are less than 1% over. Gross income minus expenses has the preschool in the black by \$10,628, which is less than projected but still positive.

Notes to the 2024 Church Operating Fund Budget

In August we created, with the approval of the Vestry, an annual Operating Fund budget as a template for the Stewardship committee and to provide a stretch goal for our pledge campaign.

We revised this budget in December to more closely match the total amount pledged. The vestry considered, suggested changes, and eventually approved the revised budget which we present here in a distilled form.

We are pleased and thankful we have for 2024 a net zero Operating Fund budget.

Addressing a couple of the larger differences from 2023:

Transfers to and from Preschool - The Preschool budget for 2023-2024 included an increase in their monthly Occupancy transfer amount beginning January 2024. (Occupancy is the amount the Preschool contributes to the Church to help pay for the shared resources they use.) This line reflects that increase.

Human Resources – In addition to regular cost of living raises, this line includes an amount for an additional staff member to work with children and youth. The Children and Youth Fund is contributing the same amount to the Operating Fund and that amount is reflected in the total amount in *Transfers to and from Designated Funds.*

Ministries & Outreach - We increased the budget here to ensure available amounts for giving a regular, predictable amount to certain community charities.

Music – We plan to pay for certain predicted expenses for musicians either directly from the Music Fund, or through approved reimbursements from the Music Fund to the Operating Fund.

A full, detailed budget broken down by general ledger account and by each month is available to anyone who would like to review it by contacting the Church office or the Treasurer.

St. Stephen's Food Pantry & Nonfood Collections

On the first Saturday of every month in the church parking lot, we host a collection of food and nonfood products for needy families in Santa Clarita. Although the summer months at times become very slim collections, we often collect 20 or more large bags of groceries, paper products, and other needed items like socks, underwear, feminine products, and detergent.

We are very grateful to parishioner John Alexopoulos for making four beautiful large wooden boxes for the narthex to be used for collections on Sundays or between our monthly dates.

The total donations received and delivered in 2023 included the following:

- Santa Clarita Food Pantry 198 large bags of groceries and 3 bags of small personal products
- Bridge to Home 51 large boxes of cereal, 10 packs of socks, 9 packs of underwear, a dozen shower slippers, and 5 large bags of small personal products
- Family Promise 38 large bottles of dish detergent, 26 bags of feminine products, 20 large packs of diapers, 9 cases of toilet paper, and 5 cases of paper towels
- Church of Hope 24 bags of groceries, 10 cases of canned vegetables, and 3 large bags of personal products

Our outreach volunteers went to work immediately after the **7.8** earthquake that struck Turkey and Syria in February last year. We collected 13 tents, 23 blankets, and 15 sleeping bags to donate to the earthquake victims through the College of the Canyons Student Center.

In September, the Santa Clarita Veterans Services Collaborative was added to our list of recipients, and we were able to donate 3 cases of toilet paper, 3 large packs of paper towels, and a case of Kleenex for distribution to veterans in need.

Internal Community Relations Annual Report

Parishioners at St. Stephen's continued to contribute to a thriving parish life in 2023, as witnessed by a number of service/participation groups and several new events.

The SAGES, a group that promotes service within the community and the church, is open to all senior members. The group holds monthly lunches on the second Thursday of each month, and this year included outings to Marston's, Red Robin, Spumoni's, California Pizza Kitchen, Mimi's Cafe, Olive Garden, Old Town Junction, Brophy Brothers at the Ventura Marina, and the homes of several members. Movie Days are held on the fourth Thursday of each month at the Laemmle Theater in downtown Newhall. As part of their outreach, SAGES donated 12 backpacks fully stuffed with school supplies as part of the "Backpack Project" for school-age children in the Hart School District to make sure they had a backpack on the first day of school. The group also volunteered their time to help needy families at Thanksgiving, filling 29 Turkey Baskets with donated food and turkeys for needy families within the Hart School District.

The St. Stephen's Men's Group continues to grow, following the end of the pandemic. They meet for breakfast the first Saturday of the month at Dink's Deli in Granary Square in Valencia, and all members of the St. Stephen's community are welcome to join. The group helps maintain the building and grounds, assists the Altar Guild in getting the church prepared for Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, and other important days in the Church calendar, as well as help out with church fundraisers.

The St. Stephen's Book Group holds monthly meetings in the sacristy and on Zoom. Books discussed this year include <u>The Faith Club</u>, which is about three mothers, Jewish, Moslem and Episcopalian, who started to write a children's book about religion, and Sister Joan Chittester's book, <u>The Time Is Now</u>.

The Angel Network is a new group at St. Stephen's this year, and the group has grown significantly over the past 12 months. The Angel Network is a ministry to help us provide care and support to one another. The network includes smaller communities of warm-hearted friends called *halos*. The *halo* groups consist of 8-10 members who intentionally care for one another, and find fellowship together by meeting during coffee hour, sitting together at church, participating in Bible study groups, etc. The group is in the process of recruiting new members as well.

The second annual "Trunk or Treat" took place on Saturday, October 28 from 4-6 pm in the church parking lot and was a huge success on all fronts. As a safe and fun way for families and children to dress up in costumes and trick or treat, the event was well attended with over 100 participants and featured parishioners and local residents serving treats from over 30 decorated cars and trucks, as well as a face painter, balloon artist, food truck, and more.

St. Stephen's became an official congregation in 1963, and a series of events were held throughout the year to celebrate the church's 60th Anniversary. The Diamond Jubilee Gala Event & Fundraiser took place on Saturday, October 14, but the celebration kicked off June 23 with the first in a series of "Movie Nights." Each month a film was screened in Spurling Hall, beginning with 1963's "Beach Party," 1973's "Jesus Christ Superstar," 1983's "Return of the Jedi," 1993's "The Nightmare Before Christmas," and 2003's "Finding Nemo." Then, on Sunday, August 6, it was St. Stephen's "Story Day": a celebration of the church's history and a means of helping create a historical archive for the church.

St. Stephen's Diamond Jubilee Gala & Auction celebrating 60 years in Santa Clarita, which took place on October 14, was an astounding success on every level, involving more than 75 community and parish volunteers. More than 220 guests mingled at a cocktail reception with silent auction, live music, and raffles, in Spurling Hall, followed by a live-auction dinner and dessert auction in the "outside ballroom" in the church's courtyard. The event was attended by a number of civic guests, including Santa Clarita Mayor Jason Gibbs, and Assemblywoman Pilar Schiavo, who issued a proclamation to St. Stephen's, co-sponsored by Senator Scott Wilk, as well as a number of our community partners, like PFLAG, Child & Family Center, Bridge to Home, and the NAACP. Over \$40,000 was raised, which is going towards the feasibility stages of a Capital Campaign for the church.

The 60th Anniversary Celebration concluded on Gratitude Sunday, November 19, with a rousing Jazz Vespers concert put on by Judy Baity and the St. Stephen's Choir, followed by a reception in Spurling Hall, at which more than \$700 was raised for the music program.

St. Stephen's Preschool Annual Report

St. Stephen's Preschool continues to be a staple in the faith based preschool community serving a little over 100 children, their families as well as employing 17 regular staff members and 2 substitute teaching staff. The preschool program serves children ages 2-5 and

operates Monday thru Friday from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm. Our school year begins in mid-August and runs through early June. We also offer a special parent-tot class on Friday mornings for children ages 12 -24 months and 5-week Summer fun program.

Each month the preschool staff plan and prepare activities that are geared around various themes that may include seasons, holidays, and other special/significant events.

The preschool families continue to utilize both the early bird as well as lunch bunch options available for extended care. The full day program has seen consistent enrollment of around 10 children per day. We saw a decrease in enrollment for our pre-k or 4-year-old program as elementary schools are again changing the age cut-off for children to be enrolled. This is expected to continue into the 2024/2025 school year as children may enroll with local districts as preschoolers. We did see an increase in 2-year-old enrollments and foresee having to add another three year old class for next year, should we not have enough enrollment in our pre-k program.

Families and staff take comfort in the fact that children are happy and in an environment that is committed to their health, safety, and well-being. We greatly appreciate all the church parishioners who give to preschool in a variety of ways whether it be materials, support, or their time. We are grateful to Reverend Christopher Montella for his leadership as well as our wonderful preschool staff. Without their continued commitment to St. Stephen's, none of this would be possible. In July 2023, Melanie Long resigned as director and Stephanie Rodriguez continued her role as preschool manager while also performing all of the director duties for the remainder of the year. We are thankful for her hard work! This year three of our former employees returned as lead and assistant teachers. We welcomed Lead Teacher Brenda Astorga to our school and two of our former employers remain as St. Stephen's substitute staff. Most of our preschool staff have been at St. Stephen's for over 10 years with our most veteran staff members serving multiple decades. Vivien Firta was hired as the new director of education and formation with her start date as Jan 3, 2024.

The preschool program's enrollment has been lower than what was projected prior to opening in the fall. We ended the year with about 105 children enrolled, compared to August's enrollment of 122. The program as it is currently operating should meet the current projected budget or fall just short. The preschool budget was finalized in July, but then absorbed an increase in assistant teacher pay as we had shadows to help a few kids in the classrooms. We are currently preparing for our 2024/2025 enrollment and plan to bring in more 2 and 3 year old students to meet the needs of the community. The preschool received a grant through the State of California which was used to replace the wire fence surrounding the school's


playground (facing the church parking lot). A durable gate with mesh cover was installed, providing the school with more privacy and protection.

The preschool board continues to be very supportive of the preschool program. They value the importance of ensuring that St. Stephen's Preschool remains the caring, nurturing, developmental preschool that it is. We held a trunk or treat Halloween event as well as Gingerbread House night in December. Our hope and goal is to bring other family friendly events to St. Stephen's that can be enjoyed and attended by families from both the congregation and preschool. It has been very helpful having the participation of two staff representatives on the board in addition to two family representatives. We appreciate the opinions and expertise offered by all and the time that each dedicates to attend our monthly meetings.

Technology – 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

January 2024

As our world evolves and parishioner needs change, technology has become increasingly important at St. Stephen's. Our committee has two main areas of focus: infrastructure and operations. Our campus has an infrastructure of equipment like, computers, cameras, audio and video equipment, lighting, internet, and Wi-Fi. Our parish uses the infrastructure to conduct daily operations to communicate with one another and the outside world.

The Technology Committee consists of Dave Melton, John Noonan, and John Fortman. We also have a Tech booth team headed by Erick Long.

The following is a summary of our activities this past year.

Campus Technology added or updated

- Hired a contractor, Hearing NOW USA (https://hearingnowusa.com) to install a hearing loop system for the sanctuary
- Purchased a laptop for Reverend Christopher
- Purchased needed audio and video devices for combined in-house and remote meetings, as well as to play movies and show pictures
- Upgraded Preschool Director's computer components
- Purchased and installed remote controlled sanctuary lighting

Campus Technology repairs and maintenance

- Removed AT&T phone lines in favor of VOIP phones
- Updated sanctuary sound system
- Repaired campus security gate problems
- Maintained and updated staff desktop computers
